Dear Neighbors,

With summer rapidly approaching, I would like to share some updates from the Burleith Citizens

Association. But, first, in the biggest news, the city and region are rapidly starting to re-open. On Friday, May 21st the Mayor lifted many restrictions—particularly mask wearing for vaccinated people in many places and most capacity restrictions—further loosening will be allowed after June 11th. Individual businesses, however, may deviate from this guidance. Libraries, pools, museums and many more venues are open. It will take a while for everything to fully get back to normal, however. More information is available here: <https://coronavirus.dc.gov/data>. Also, **full parking enforcement** re-started on June 1st. I have heard from many neighbors that the situation is starting to improve, but we will have to ensure that the frequency of monitoring is sufficient.

Regarding BCA activities, our annual **spring clean-up** took place on June 5th. Many volunteers noted that the neighborhood seemed cleaner than previously, but there is always room for improvement. Big thanks to Janice Sims for organizing and Georgetown University and MedStar Georgetown University Hospital for their generous support. On that note, please remember to call 311 to schedule bulk trash pickups and to follow all procedures, for instance, placing a plastic covering overall discarded mattresses.

As I mentioned previously, the BCA Board decided to **postpone the summer picnic** to Saturday, September 18th. Although it would have been wonderful to socialize as a community in early June as we traditionally have done, the picnic takes several months to plan and there are restrictions on the size of gatherings until June 11th. We also always try to avoid the high summer months when so many neighbors are out of town. I am hopeful that we will still have warm weather in September and that the vaccination rate will be even higher than it currently is. Our theme this year will be "**Happy Days Are Here Again**," and, as always, we will have live music and lots to eat and drink, along with visits from local dignitaries like the mayor, Ward 2 councilmember, and ANC representative. We are also planning for a petting zoo, face painting, balloon animals, and a raffle.

The Board has recently started the process of convening an **ad hoc committee** to start planning for **Burleith's centennial in 2023**. We are looking for volunteers especially with experience in fundraising and grant-writing. Once the committee zeroes in on some promising activities and we as an organization decide what we'd like to pursue, we can look for financial support from public and private sources. One quite feasible activity would be to have welcome signs (similar to what Glover Park has) at various entrances to our neighborhood. If you would like to volunteer or to nominate another neighbor, please email bca@burleith.org. On another issue, a meeting is being convened by **Georgetown Main Street** on June 22nd.

This nonprofit organization advocates for local and small businesses in Georgetown: <https://www.georgetownmainstreet.com/>. They have been particularly concerned about a lack of commercial vitality on **Wisconsin Avenue between R and Whitehaven**—a part of Georgetown that Burleith residents frequent. The purpose of this meeting is to hear ideas from neighbors about how this stretch can be improved. Please do think about participating.

As for the other issues at play in the community, there is not much new to report. It appears that the outreach and decision-making processes have been delayed for unspecified reasons. The DDOT proposal to eliminate all of the parking places on **37th Street** between Whitehaven and Reservoir to install **bicycle lanes** has not yet progressed. Officials did ask when would be better times for them to collect data on parking availability. I suggested waiting until the post-pandemic situation normalizes itself, but then at 8 AM, 8 PM and midday, perhaps around 1 or 2 PM. I also emphasized that I do not think that any additional data will change the minds of neighbors (especially folks on 37th Street). I am hopeful that they will seriously consider "**advisory bike lanes**" that would not eliminate any parking. I strongly endorse this option.

There is no real movement on plans for **Ellington Field**. There has been some communication about conflicting wording pertaining to usage and access for public schools (versus other entities) in various DPR documents—but officials have been woefully slow in responding. The government also requested \$3.5 million for renovations in the next budget. This seems woefully inadequate

to do much of anything. We are strong advocates for prioritizing local public school and community access. I am still very unsettled by DPR's plans and process, especially their lack of a holistic approach that deals with the questions of access, operating hours, and parking from the outset. Deliberations about possible changes to **Hardy Middle School** continue. The discussion was incredibly fluid, so we shall see what decisions actually emerge. There are potential ramifications for school feeder patterns, etc.

Finally, once the 2020 census data is finalized and released this summer, there will be a discussion about **redistricting** the boundaries of all 8 wards in the city. Although much is still uncertain, given our location right on the ward boundary, there is a chance that Burleith could be taken out of Ward 2 and put into Ward 3. I strongly believe we should stay in Ward 2 for a variety of reasons including that we likely do the majority of socializing and much shopping in Ward 2 and therefore need Ward 2 parking rights. I also think it is vital to be in the same ward as the university because of its significant impact on our neighborhood. Of course, if your opinion differs, please feel free to let us know. In any case, as soon as we hear anything, we will inform the community.

Please be sure to **cut your lawns** and the curbside space abutting your house. It is also a nice gesture to others to make sure that invasive weeds like dandelions are under control in your space because the seeds spread and affect other neighbors. To reiterate, the **trash bins** in the neighborhood are looking haggard. At the least, please request a new lid free of charge from 311: <https://dpw.dc.gov/service/trash-container-repair-and-purchase>. This is especially pressing because damaged bins attract rodents.

Deer Management Program

Last November, while walking in Glover Archbold Park and other nearby paths, I noticed signs such as the one above: nighttime sharpshooters from Rock Creek Park's Deer Management Program could be in the park until March 31 of this year. I was surprised and a bit apprehensive.

A little research revealed that this is the eighth year of the Rock Creek Deer Management (i. e., culling by killing) Program, but it is the first time the program has moved into Glover Archbold Park.

A call to the Rock Creek Park Deer Management InfoLine (202-895-6009) confirmed that yes, sharpshooters actually had been in Glover Archbold, in the area between 42nd & 44th St, but only for one night. The representative told me that marksmen killed eight deer that night, and they probably won't be back this year because there are not so many deer in our area.

The goal of the program is to reduce the deer population to no more than 20 deer per square mile. "Before 1960," says the The Rock Creek Park web site, "there were no recorded sightings of white-tailed deer in the park. ... In the last decade their numbers peaked at nearly 100 per square mile." The culling by trained sharpshooters was begun in 2012 and is intended to reduce



the population "to support long-term protection and restoration of native plants and to promote a healthy and diverse forest."

I asked how Park authorities come to their estimate of deer population. Park employees set up cameras for daytime and nighttime photography at different spots in the park. The number of deer photographed over ten days, entered into a formula, determines the estimate.

Park literature stresses that those involved in the culling are trained marksmen. They shoot from elevated positions, using night vision goggles that enable them to distinguish deer from other animals, including dogs. Their ammunition does not contain lead, to prevent lead from being introduced into the forest environment, and possibly ingested by other animals. The marksmen do not target male or female deer specifically, as both cause damage to the vegetation.

The meat harvested from the deer goes to DC Central Kitchen, which distributes food all over the city. Last year the deer culling resulted in 1,320 pounds of venison, providing hundreds of meals for District families in need.
